Free tours of library offered

One thing that no student at UTD misses during his or her academic career is McDermott Library. If a student wants to use the library with effectiveness and does not want to have to learn where everything is, and what services are available by chance or hit-and-miss, he or she should take advantage of the free library tours during January.

The tours last only about half an hour. It is a "general physical tour with an orientation on finding information." The schedule should make it possible for just about every student to fit in the tour during the first month of the spring semester.

There will be tours on Wednesday, Jan. 20, and Friday, Jan. 22, at 12:30 p.m. On Thursday, Jan. 21, and on Tuesday, Jan. 26 there will be tours at 5:30 p.m. Monday, Jan. 25, there will be a tour at 7:30 p.m.

Anyone wishing to take the tour should contact a staff member at the circulation or reference desks.

McCauley appointed business manager

M. Dudley McCauley II, formerly budget director for The University of Texas at Dallas, is the new business manager for UTD's Callier Center for Communication Disorders.

McCauley's appointment, effective Dec. 1, was announced by Dr. Donald Henderson, director of Callier Center, and Jere Pederson, UTD's vice president for business affairs.

In his new position, McCauley will be responsible for direction of Callier's non-academic operations, including purchasing, accounting, patient billing and collection and the physical plant.

McCauley, 40, has been with UTD since June, 1978, when he joined the university as budget director. Previously, he had worked with an Austin investment services firm and with the Texas Legislative Budget Office. He also served four years with the United States Navy, including one year in Vietnam as a medic with the Third Marines.

Scholarships available for marketing students

The Western Association of Food Chains will be sponsoring scholarships for marketing students attending UTD in the fall. Two graduate students, majoring in marketing, will receive \$1,000 each, and three undergraduate students, also marketing majors, will receive \$500 each. The awards are available for the spring and fall semesters of 1982.

General requirements for applicants are as follows: fill out and return the UTD Scholarship application, which includes two letters of recommendation, to the Financial Aid office; and, submit a current UTD transcript.

Specific requirements include

the following: undergraduate or graduate standing, majoring in marketing; a GPA of 3.5 or better; applicants must have at least one year of study left at the University; and, applicants must be enrolled full time (nine semester hours or more for graduates, twelve semester hours or more for undergraduates). Part-time students may apply if they will attend on a full-time basis during the scholarship award period.

Deadline for submission of applications to the Financial Aid office is Tuesday, Jan. 15, 1982. The scholarships will be awarded on or after Feb. 1, 1982.

'Death of a Salesman' opens 1982 theater season

"'Death of a Salesman' is one of the most written about American plays because it brought up the question of whether the contemporary theater world could support such a tragedy," observes Carolyn Gillespie, assistant professor of theater and director of this production of Arthur Miller's controversial play. "The book was even banned from high school libraries because it emphasized the sickness and death of the American dream," she continues.

The play focuses on 63-year-old Willy Loman, a salesman who has pounded the roads for 40 years, and is no longer able to handle the job. Gillespie tells: "He has a long-suffering wife, and two unsuccessful sons who have no plans for the future."

Willy's philosophy is clear-cut: "A salesman has got to dream, boy . . . it comes with the territory."

His older son, Biff, a former high school football star, works as a Texas ranch hand. The younger son, Happy, has a minor position in business.

"The high hopes Willy has for his sons will never be realized," Gillespie says. "They are now back living at home, not going anywhere. He realizes they will be just like him."

The feeling of disgust with the family is not a one-way

street, Gillespie continues. Biff cannot respect his father because of the past. On a surprise visit to see his father on the road, he catches him with another woman in Boston. Biff has never forgiven him for that. He's decided Willy is a fake, a philanderer on the road.

Finally, the two brothers decided "to do something profitable." They try to set up a sporting goods store. "It's just a pipe dream," notes Gillespie, as Biff can't raise any support for the business.

The show begins Jan. 15 and runs three weekends through Jan. 31. Friday and Saturday shows start at 8:15 p.m., with Sunday performances at 7 p.m. Tickets are \$4 adults; \$3 senior citizens, students and adult groups; \$2.50 student groups. NRC plans 250 awards

The National Research Council will make 250 Research Associateship awards in 1982, open to doctoral level scientists.

The program provides opportunities for research on problems largely of the winners' own choosing, but compatible with interests of the supporting laboratory.

Awards are for one year, with possible second-year extensions. Basic stipends range up from \$22,400 a year for recent doctoral graduates.

Applications to NRC must be made prior to Jan. 15, 1982, and awards will be announced in April.

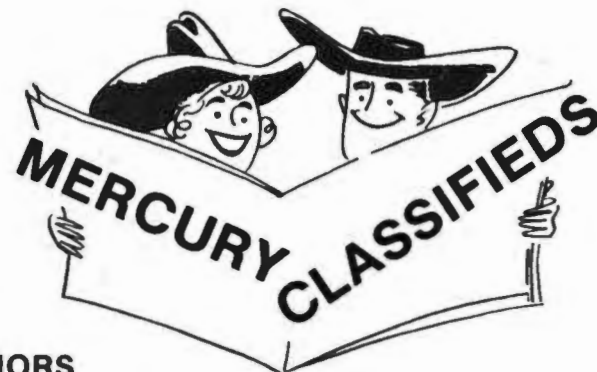

Handicap parking by permit only

If you are permanently or temporarily disabled and need handicap parking at UTD, please follow the steps listed.

1. For permanent disability or a temporary disability greater than 60 days, obtain application for disabled persons special identifying insignia or card from the County Tax Assessors office, Student Health Service MC 1.502 or the Office of International and Special Services GR 2.514. If you have a temporary disability of 60 days or less go to the Student Health Service MC 1.502 to obtain a UTD Temporary Handicap form, then go directly to the UTD Traffic Office.

2. Section I of permanent or temporary disability (greater than 60 days) application must be filled by applicant and Section II by a licensed physician.

3. Take signed application to the County Tax Assessors office in the county in which you

reside.

4. Bring your car registration if permanently disabled or the temporarily disabled person's identification card if temporarily disabled to the Special Services Office handicapped adviser GR 2.514 for assistance in processing application for a UTD handicap decal. Staff and faculty - go directly to the Traffic Office.

5. To purchase a UTD handicap parking decal, take car registration or identification card to the UTD Traffic Office FN 1.207.

Scholarship funds available for spring and fall 1982

Undergraduate scholarships in accounting, the arts and photography are being offered for the spring semester, 1982. There will be a total of seven awards available to UTD students through these three scholarships.

One award of \$250 from the Robert L. Kirk Photography Scholarship will be given for photography students. Among other criteria will be a portfolio of pictures "which are a recent outgrowth of work completed at UTD."

The Lord & Taylor Scholarship includes three awards, each \$250, in the arts. One award will be made in each of the following: Visual Arts, Theatre, and Music.

An ARCO Minority Accounting Scholarship will present three awards, each \$250, available to "minority students enrolled in Business and Public Administration with a concentration in Accounting."

Application deadline for all three scholarships, and all

seven awards is Feb. 1, 1982. Complete information and applications are available to all UTD students through the Office of Financial Aid and Student Employment located in the McDermott Library lower level near the bookstore.

Phi Theta Kappa Alumni is offering two book scholarships for the spring semester. One is for \$100 for a PTK transfer student entering UT-Dallas for the first time this spring.

Applications can be picked up in the Financial Aid office on the lower level of McDermott.

The other book scholarship of \$50 is for a present member of the Iota Chapter of UTD. Applications can be picked up in the office of Pre-admissions Counseling on the lower level of McDermott Library.

All PTK'ers are urged to apply as this is based on grades and not on financial need. This is the first time these scholarships have been offered.

Deadline for the scholarships is Feb. 1.

Record reviews

TATOO YOU is more reminiscent of the 1960's Rolling Stones than any of their last five albums. Clearly the Stones have made a break with glitter and drugs as an excuse for music. Instead, this album consists of well produced and well defined songs.

Undoubtedly Kieth and Mick had specific ideas in mind when they recorded "Start Me Up," "Hangfire," and "Waiting on a Friend" in the studio. All three cuts are individualistic and, ever so, rugged: this album is only rock and roll.

Of course, Jagger's vocals are the focal point of this album; nevertheless, Richard's guitar is an indispensable part of the Rolling Stones individualistically, unified sound.

On "Little T & A" (She's My Little Rock and Roll) Watt's drumming and Wyman's bass combine to act as the cohesive force that has consistently earned the Stones the maximum rhythm and blues title.

TATOO YOU may be seen as a cultural statement about the "me generation" and the need for individualism and humanism. Be that as it may, I think **TATOO YOU** is an excellent rock and roll album. "All right"

At the end of each of the following reviews you will find a grade. The grades are familiar to all of us; you can figure them out easily without a guide.

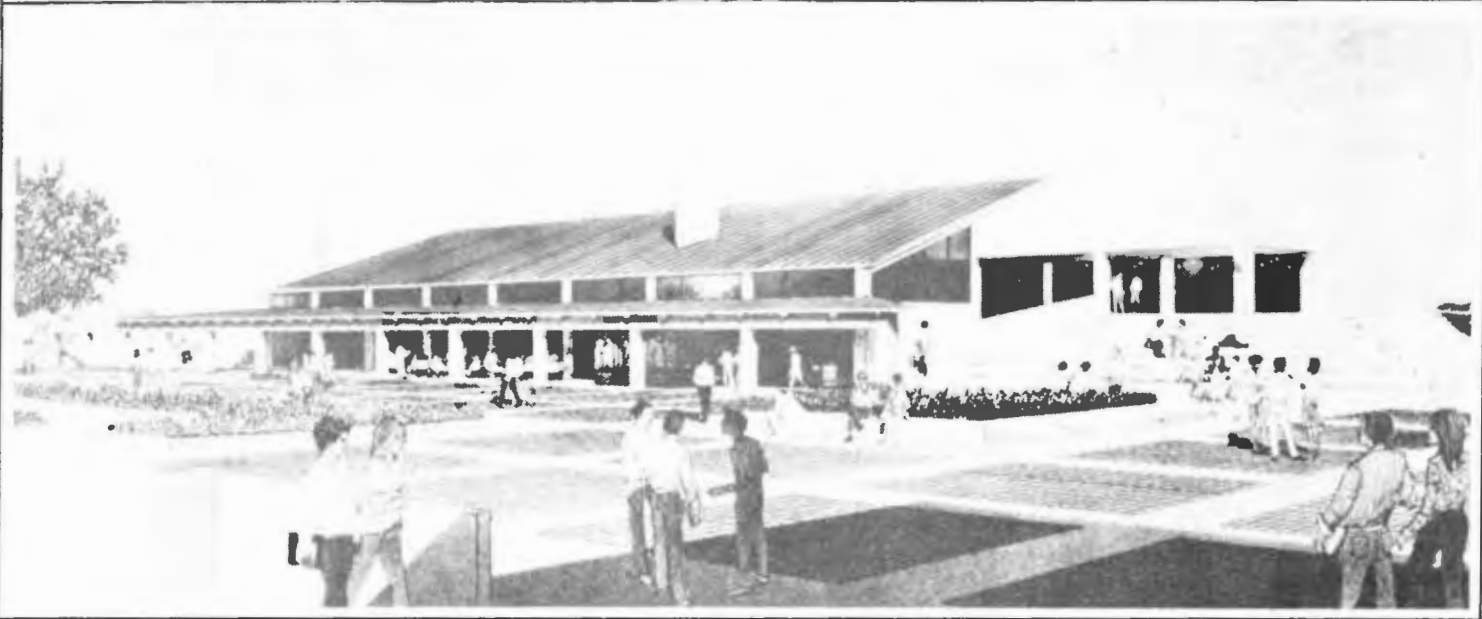
Hopefully Tom will continue to give us this advice in future issues.

Grover Washington has attempted to equal his musicianship of "Mister Magic," and the saxophonist almost repeats that prior performance with the new album **COME MORNING**. This highly listenable album does not equal "Mister Magic," nonetheless, the album is one that even non-jazz purists will enjoy.

Even though the vocals detract some from Washington's "driving African beats," the amount of detraction is but a trifle. **COME MORNING**, Elektra/Asylum, SE-562: Grade B+

After listening to Lenny White's latest album, **TWENNY-NINE WITH LENNY WHITE**, a listener would never know that he has been a "dynamic part of contemporary music's history for more than a decade, from his early work with Miles Davis and Return to Forever." Unfortunately White has been "hanging out" with the wrong crowd as **TWENNY-NINE** is pure disco. White may have been one of the best jazz-rock drummers, but today he is not **TWENNY-NINE WITH LENNY WHITE**. Elektra/Asylum, SE-551: Grade D.

Accounting Honor Society

The Accounting Honor Society has been formed to encourage and give recognition to scholastic and professional excellence in the field of accounting. The Society hosts a number of events throughout the year. The programs are designed to inform the members about current issues and opportunities in the profession, and to provide a social atmosphere in which members can meet and talk with practicing accountants.

Students are eligible for election to membership after they have completed nine hours of accounting (including hours taken at a junior college—the last three hours in accounting must have been at UTD), and if they have attained a cumulative grade point average in accounting courses of at least 3.25 equivalent, and in all subjects attempted of at least a 3.0. Members of the accounting faculty are eligible for election as are other persons who have achieved prominence in the field of accounting.

The initiation fee is \$10 and the application deadline is Jan 31. Applications may be obtained in Green 3306.

We are facing an exciting semester. Our state convention will be held in San Antonio in February. Our national convention will be held in Minneapolis in March.
















