UTD AT A GLANCE

The University of Texas at Dallas was founded in 1969 when civic and industrial leaders Cecil Green, Erik Jonsson and Eugene McDermott, the founders of Texas Instruments, gave the Southwest Center for Advanced Studies to the State of Texas.

U.T. Dallas grew in a top-down manner: it first offered doctorate and master's degrees before accepting junior and senior undergraduate students in 1975. In 1990, U.T. Dallas enrolled its first freshman class, offering a new opportunity for Texas high school seniors to study in a rigorous and fulfilling academic environment.

PHILOSOPHY AND PURPOSE STATEMENT UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS AT DALLAS INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

As an integral part of the total educational program within the University, the athletic program is subject to the same aims, policies, and objectives as other departments and programs on campus. The purpose of athletics at The University of Texas at Dallas is to provide competitive opportunities to students which foster physical, social and emotional benefits along with a sense of sportsmanship. In pursuit of this, the athletic department emphasizes the development of the student-athlete's mind, body, and spirit in a manner complementary to the academic program and places special importance on the student-athletes instead of spectators and on the university community rather than the entertainment needs of the general public. Looking, to the future, the University has developed an expanding athletic program competing in the NCAA Division III, which exists for schools that offer no athletic scholarships, and emphasizes amaeur athletics and fair play with the total well being of the student-athletes in mind. Choosing to offer athletics under those circumstances fulfills the need of those students who desire to participate in sports while pursuing a college degree. Student athletes are reminded that above all, the main purpose of attending the college is to obtain an education.



AMERICAN SOUTHWEST CONFERENCE

The American Southwest Conference has been in existence since 1996, but its beginnings date back to 1976 with the formation of the Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association (TIAA).

The TIAA, a non-scholarship and coeducational athletic conference (the first organization of its kind in the Southwest), was formed on May 2, 1976 and consisted of five charter members --Austin College (Sherman, Texas), McMurry College (Abilene, Texas), Sul Ross State University (Alpine, Texas), Tarleton State University (Stephenville, Texas) and Trinity University (San Antonio, Texas).

Before aligning with the new TIAA organization, Sull Ross State and Tarleton State were members of the Lone Star Conference, McMurry participated in the Texoma Conference and both Austin College and Trinity were independents.

At the time of its formation, the member schools of the TIAA maintained their individual institutional affiliations with national intercollegiate athletic organizations such as the NCAA and NAIA before the conference solely became NCAA Division III.

Today, the conference consists of sixteen schools -- Concordia University at Austin, Hardin-Simmons University, Howard Payne University, McMurry University, Schreiner College, Sul Ross State University, Texas Lutheran University, University of Mary Hardin-Baylor, Austin College, East Texas Baptist University, LeTourneau University, Louisiana College, Mississippi College, University of Dallas, University of the Ozarks, and The University of Texas at Dallas.

In May 1996, Fred Jacoby was named the first commissioner of the American Southwest Conference. Under his guidance, the ASC has actively pursued conference membership expansion. In August 1999, Dan Lathey joined the ASC as the Director of Media Relations.




Growing up in Richardson, Texas, he played club soccer for Sparta Blue and for J.J. Pearce High School. Both teams were perennial district and state champions.

UTD Welcomes Youth Soccer To The University Athletic Complex

UTD RENOVATES AND EXPANDS SOCCER COMPLEX

With help from Dallas Cup, Inc., North Texas State Soccer Association, and The Lake Highlands Girls Classic League, The University of Texas at Dallas is renovating and expanding its soccer complex. The University is currently renovating the five existing soccer fields on campus and adding three additional fields. Construction on the complex began July 18, 1999, and completion is expected in February 2000.

The eight soccer fields, six of which will be lighted, are being constructed in order to meet the demand of the growing popularity of youth soccer in the Dallas area. The soccer complex will serve as a home for the Girls Classic League, the North Texas Soccer Olympic Development Program, Spring Classic Girls Invitational Soccer Tournament at Dallas Cup, Dallas Cup, Inc. and the UTD men's and women's soccer programs.

The University of Texas at Dallas Athletic Department is extremely excited about the renovation and expansion. "This complex will be one of the best soccer facilities in the Southwest. We at the UTD Athletic Department look forward to inviting the best youth soccer players in Dallas and in the world to compete at this facility," said Coach Jack Peel.
