Shot fails to help test in Hamilton County

Ranger, Texas.—Nitro shot given Seaboard Oil Corporation's fee 1, northeastern Hamilton County wildcat, failed to increase the yield of high gravity oil from Ellenberger limestone logged at 4144-4169 feet, with an elevation of 1228 feet, and the hole will be deepened. The well is capable of about 25 barrels of 40.3 gravity oil daily. No water has appeared from the Ellenberger. Formation at 4144-4152 feet was shot with 20 quarts. This wildcat, the first prospective oil producer for the county, is located on 112½-acre tract, A. C. Grimes Survey, about 3 miles west by north of Fairy and about 18 miles northeast of two prolific gas wells completed last year by the above company in Marble Falls lime near the 2500-foot level.



GAS SHOW REPORTED IN SHELBY WILDCAT

JOAQUIN, Texas, March 3.—H. A. Stebbinger's No. 2 Pickering Lumber Co. A. Hansen survey, Shelby county, three-quarters of a mile south of the same operator's No. 1 Pickering, in the C. F. Henry survey, that was a gas-distillate well at 5,029 feet, is coring below 4,920 feet, at which depth it was in hard crystalized lime. It is reported that the well, when operations were resumed Tuesday after a few days shun-down due to the death of a member of the drilling crew from pnenpmonia, blew gas which had built up, for approximately an hour.

A blow-out preventer is on location. Some expressed the opinion that the gah may be coming from the 3,800-foot level where a well completed as a gasser several years ago was competed and where a gas showing appeared in No. 1 Pickering.

SEABOARD MAKES GAS PRODUCER AT BIENVILLE WILDCAT

Well Also Shows Spray of
Distillate on Test Made
Wednesday.

Proving Glen Rose production on structure which only last week it showed for a big gasser from the Travis Peak, Seaboard Oil Co.'s McGee No. 1, section 3-16-6, in the Dear Creek area of Bienville parish, was placed on record Wednesday by local oil men as an important discovery.

Testing after casing was perforated from 6,665-95 feet in what corresponds to the Young zone at Rodessa, the well late Wednesday showed estimated 2 1-2 million feet of gas through 1-4 inch choke with spray of distillate. Casing pressure was 1,700 pounds and tubing 2,250 pounds.

Definitely opening a new producing structure, the well plugged back and perforated in the Young zone of the Glen Rose after showing for a large wet gasser from the Travis Peak. It was drilled to total depth of 8,017 before the test of the Travis Peak was made.

Location is about midway between Bryceland and Bienville and about 10 miles west of Lide, Greer & Marr's Driscoll structure on which one Glen Rose gasser was completed last year and on which operators are now drilling deep test in hopes of oil. This well also tested good show of gas from the Travis Peak. It was below 7,450 feet Wednesday.





Operates as an Amateur At Plant Where He Works

After working with radio apparatus for more than twenty years George W. Brune turned to amateur radio to familiarize himself with the performance of equipment under actual operating conditions. Since 1933, when he first obtained an amateur license, he has been developing a ham transmitter, incorporating in it many practices usually found only in commercial jobs.

Chief of inspection at the Federal Telegraph Co., 200 Mt. Pleasant avenue, Brune has installed the completed amateur band transmitter in a room set aside for the purpose at the plant. On the roof two forty-five-foot steel masts hold up an east and west directional antenna and it is no unusual accomplishment to hold phone conversations with amateurs as far west as the Hawaiian Islands.


Built into a lightweight steel relay rack of standard size, the trans-

mitter has been dressed up by silver plating the panels and etching the names of the various controls upon them. The satin silver finish sets off the many meters found on the panels and upon the entire transmitter has been expended the workmanship generally associated with fine watchmaking. Brune has designed and himself built every component part, even to the heavy transformers used, and the leisure time of three years was needed to complete the job.

Another job, which is as yet solely on paper, is the remote controlling of the station from Brune's home a few blocks away, at 254 Mt. Prospect avenue. It is proposed to use a 1 1/4-meter transmitter at the house to control the large transmitter. This extremely short wave station, in itself a difficult bit of engineering since the shortest waves used with any practicability by amateurs are around five meters, would actuate relays to put the large transmitter on the air as well as carry Brune's voice.

Goes Back to 1913

A graduate of Oregon State University, class of 1911, Brune gained his first radio experience in 1913. An acquaintance enlisted his aid in building up an amateur station and in time the station was completed. However, because of its location—it

mitter has been dressed up by silver plating the panels and etching the names of the various controls upon them. Distant Contacts

The station signs the call W2HLF and, even though its antenna is directional, contacts have been made with South American stations as well as those amateur stations across the Atlantic. The transmitter consists of five stages; an electron-coupled oscillator sets the frequency and a pair of 211 tubes in the final stage have a power input in the neighborhood of 350 watts.

Because it is in the nature of an experimental transmitter Brune has much work yet to do upon it. At present he is busy assembling the needed coil equipment to change the operating frequency to the ten-meter

was in Oregon—and because of the limited range of all wireless signals in those early years, no contacts were ever made with it.

In 1917 Brune joined the organization he is now connected with and at the Palo Alto, Cal., plant of the company he took charge of the switching assembly of two 500-kilowatt arc transmitters being built for the government. Far exceeding in power any previously built, these transmitters were intended for use at the Pearl Harbor Naval Station and in France. The arcs had to be keyed by detuning and Brune recalls that it took ninety-six relays to make possible a break in the tank circuit. On test, the transmitters were capable of putting 740 amperes each into the antenna. Several months later, while tuning a one-tube receiver, Brune was thrilled to hear the signals of the transmitter set up at Bordeaux, France, pounding through with a thump.

Brune has been associated with all phases of commercial transmitter manufacture. He moved East in 1931 and has since made his home in this vicinity. He is a member of the Bloomfield Radio Club and serves on that organization's board of directors.

Expect Change In Ballston Spa Village Offices

Economy Party's Victory Believed to Presage the Political Upheaval; Con- trol Trustees

BALLSTON SPA, March 17.—Although not definitely committing themselves, Economy party candidates, who won a sweeping victory Tuesday in Ballston Spa village election, indicated they had many changes in appointive personnel in mind. They take control of village affairs April 1.

The victorious candidates, Fred C. Morehouse, mayor, and Edward J. Morley and Maxwell G. Gregg, trustees, stated they had made no promises for political appointments, but it was generally understood they contemplated changing the village clerk, street, water and sewer commissioners and eliminating many jobs they feel are unnecessary in the water and sewer departments.

There is strong talk of drafting William H. Lawrence, former village clerk, for that position to succeed Ralph E. Dunton, clerk since the Republican party took over the reins eight years ago. It is also believed John B. Dower will be named street commissioner and Commissioner Walter Heffner will be retained. There is also some talk of putting back J. Henry Lowell as sewer department commissioner, but this was deemed unlikely among political friends of the Economy party. Lowell was commissioner before the Republicans came into power, and since that time Walter N. Burnham has held the post.

The Economy party, by winning three offices, won control of the board of trustees. Republican trustees remaining are Wright Scidemore jr. and Darwin B. Simmons. The board meets for formal organization April 1.






