Four Indian films slated for January

Four films by Indian filmmaker Satyajit Ray are set to be shown in two double feature sessions Wednesday, Jan. 27 and Friday, Jan. 29 in Founders North Auditorium. Students can see these classics for only 50¢ each session.

Satyajit Ray's Apu Trilogy begins Jan. 27 at 7:30 p.m. with "Pather Panchali," (Song of the Road). Rural Bengal is "seen through the sensitive eyes of young Apu, whose innocence is reflected against the wisdom of his aged aunt," according to News and Information Services'

At 9:30 p.m. "Aparajito" (The Unvanquished) tells of the family's travels to Benares on the Ganges where Apu, now an adolescent, begins his education. The music for both of these films was composed and is performed by Ravi Shankar.

The conclusion of the Apu Trilogy will be shown at 7:30 p.m. Jan. 29. In "World of Apu," Apu (Soumitra Chatterjee), is wed to 14 year old Aparna (Sharmila Tagore) and is a writer in Calcutta.

A very different theme from the Apu Trilogy pervades Ray's first color film "Kachenjungha." Here Ray attempts "a dissection of the Indian upper class. warped by the long British colonization."

All four films were made in India and are rated G. "Pather Panchali," made in 1954, lasts one hour and 52 minutes; "Aparajito," 1956, one hour and 48 minutes, "World of Apu," 1959 (no time available); "Kanchenjungha," one hour and 42 minutes.

Special display of aviation paintings

Original paintings of 12 fighter aircraft and a racer, which gained fame during the world wars and between, will be displayed in McDermott Library's Special Collections, History of Aviation Collection, third floor McDermott Library, through Feb. 19.

Most of the paintings, the work of Arlington artist Raymond Waddey, have been autographed by the aces and top pilots who flew the planes.
