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MORE "TEACHERS BECOME STUDENTS" -- 24 ANNOUNCED FOR COLLEGE TEACHERS' SHORT COURSE IN EARTH SCIENCES, GIVEN FOR SECOND YEAR AT SOUTHWEST CENTER

DALLAS --

Twenty-four college teachers will come to the Southwest Center for Advanced Studies this summer for a three-week short course in earth sciences.

The course will be given in the Center's Geosciences Division, August 5-23. It is being given for the second summer.

Two of the teacher-students are chairmen of their college geology and related science departments; two others are professors, and 10 hold other professorial ranks.

Dr. Anton L. Hales, Head of the SCAS Geosciences Division, is the course director. Major support for the short course has been provided by the National Science Foundation for the second year, through a grant for stipends and travel assistance.

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The earth sciences course // the second to be held for college teachers this summer at SCAS. Beginning July 8, a total of 32 special students, most of them from college faculties, will attend a three-week course in molecular genetics offered by the Biology division.

Four of the earth sciences teachers will come from Ohio, three from Pennsylvania, three from Wisconsin, and two each from Kansas and Virginia. Other states represented, each by one teacher, are California, Georgia, Indiana, Louisiana,

Massachusetts, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Texas.

Asst. Prof. Iradj Yassini of the geology department, Tehran University, in Iran, will also participate. He holds degrees in geology from his own university, and is a doctoral graduate of the University of Bordeaux, France, in paleontology.

University, Ohio, and Dr. William M. Jordan, Chairman, Department of Earth
and Space Sciences, Millersville State College, Pennsylvania, are the
department heads who plan to attend. Both are doctoral graduates of the
University of Wisconsin, in geology.
