by Democrats and would offer amendments to give stronger control of antipoverty programs to the states. Chairman Carl D. Perkins (D-Ky.) predicted "a bloody fight." The Senate voted an extension of the programs Oct. 14 (see Vol. XVIII, No. 37).

McElroy Announces NSF Reorganization, Defines New Positions National Science Foundation Director William D. McElroy this week announced a reorganization of NSF, implementing the provisions of recent amendments to the NSF Act. He said he is designating the four new assistant director positions, established by the Act, as: assistant director

for institutional programs, assistant director for education, assistant director for research, and assistant director for national and international programs. The four are presidential appointees, but none has yet been named.

The salary of each of the four is \$36,000. The director's salary is \$42,500, and the deputy director's is \$40,000.

In September, McElroy named Bernard Sisco assistant director for administration (see Vol. XVIII, No. 31). This position does not require a Presidential appointment.

McElroy said that Louis Levin, the executive associate director, will perform the functions of deputy director until this position is filled by Presidential nomination and Senate confirmation.

Following are details of the reorganization, as outlined by McElroy:

Under each of the four new assistant directors, a deputy assistant director position has been established. Named to serve in these posts are current members of the NSF staff, as follows: acting deputy assistant director for institutional programs—Dr. Howard E. Page; deputy assistant director for education—Dr. Thomas D. Fontaine; deputy assistant director for research—Dr. Randal M. Robertson; acting deputy assistant director for national and international programs—Dr. Thomas O. Jones.

The positions of associate directors and deputy associate directors have been abolished.

Other appointments under the present reorganization are as follows: executive assistant to the deputy assistant director for education—Dr. Keith R. Kelson; executive assistant to the deputy assistant director for research—Dr. Edward P. Todd.

The reorganization components under the four new Assistant Directorships are as follows:

Assistant Director for Institutional Programs: Included within this organizational component are the five organizational units previously assigned to the associate director (institutional relations). These are: Departmental Science Development Section; Graduate Science Facilities Section; University Science Development Section; Institutional Grants for Science Program; and Architectural Services Staff.

Assistant Director for Education: Included within this organizational component are the three divisions previously assigned to the associate director (education). These are: Division of Graduate Education in Science; Division of Undergraduate Education in Science; and Division of Pre-College Education in Science. All NSF education programs, including fellowships, advanced science education, college improvement programs, teacher programs, and student programs, will continue to be assigned to the three science education divisions.

Assistant Director for Research: The following organizational units report to the assistant director for research: Division of Biological and Medical Sciences; Division of Engineering; Division of Social Sciences; Division of Environmental Sciences, including all functions presently assigned except the Office of Antarctic Programs, the Ocean Sediment Coring Program, and the responsibility for the management of the National Center for Atmospheric Research; Division of Mathematical and Physical Sciences, including all functions presently assigned except the responsibility for the management of the three national observatories, the Cornell Synchrotron, and the Arecibo facility; and Office of Interdisciplinary Research on Problems of Our Society. This is a new office that will administer the program of Interdisciplinary Research Relevant to Problems of Our Society, which is included in the NSF budget for Fiscal Year 1970. [See Vol. XVIII, No. 27.] The program will be formally initiated at such time as funds may become available. The office will have the

specific responsibility for developing and managing the program, which is designed to encourage the academic community to undertake research directly relevant to problems of our time.

Assistant Director for National and International Programs: The following organizational units report to the assistant director for national and international programs: Office of Antarctic Programs; Office of Sea Grant Programs; Office of Computing Activities; Office of Science Information Service; Office of International Programs, including all functions presently assigned to the Office of International Science Activities; and Office of National Centers and Facilities Operations, which has responsibility for managing the Ocean Sediment Coring Program, the National Center for Atmospheric Research, the National Radio Astronomy Observatory, the Kitt Peak National Observatory, the Cerro-Tololo Interamerican Observatory, the Cornell Synchrotron, and the Arecibo facility.

The foundation, meanwhile, sent a letter this week to more than 150 major institutions informing them that they may exceed the expenditure limitation imposed earlier by as much as five percent "if necessary to support Foundation sponsored activities at an effective level."

The letter, sent by Assistant Director Sisco, noted that "actions taken to date this fiscal year have provided a sufficient brake on expenditures to permit greater flexibility in the management of institutional limitations."

Following is an excerpt from his letter:

"We have just completed a careful review of all demands against the total expenditure allowance made available to the National Science Foundation this fiscal year. It seems clear that the limitations imposed have not only served to hold down expenditures thus far this fiscal year but have had the effect of curtailing plans for the balance of the year. While it is essential that expenditures be held to the minimum necessary to enable the foundation to stay within the over-all expenditure allowance set by the Bureau of the Budget, it is also our purpose to manage our funds so as to have as little adverse effect on scientific research and science education as possible. We know that under the limitations it has not been possible in many cases to carry on NSF funded programs at effective levels.

"It is our judgment that actions taken to date this fiscal year have provided a sufficient brake on expenditures to permit greater flexibility in the management of institutional limitations. Accordingly, you may exceed the expenditure limitation at your institution by as much as five percent if necessary to support foundation sponsored activities at an effective level. We request further that you carefully review expenditures under NSF grants as of February 28, 1970. If at that time further adjustment in the limitation is justified to accommodate new programs or to afford relief where hardship has resulted, specifically documented requests for increases will be entertained. Sufficient detail should be submitted to permit an understanding of the problem. Such requests should reach the foundation by March 15, 1970. We will expect also that in cases where the limitation exceeds actual requirements, recommendations for appropriate downward adjustment will also be made. Limitation amounts surrendered can be utilized in other institutions or areas of expenditure. We hope to be able to relieve inequities to the full extent that our resources will permit.

"By this action we do not intend to preclude requests for adjustment where special circumstances arise prior to next March.

"Letters of Credit will not be adjusted to reflect the five percent leeway. If cash is required beyond that obtainable under the Letters of Credit, it can be obtained by using the Monthly Cash Request, NSF Form 4-49. . . ."

Senate Panel Restores \$40 Million for NSF Over House Allowance

The Senate Appropriations Committee on Nov. 6 recommended \$458 million for the National Science Foundation in the current fiscal year, \$40 million more than was approved by the House. The recommendation is contained in a bill providing some \$15 billion to run 18

government agencies this year.

The committee said that its total figure for NSF is \$39 million below the budget estimate, but that a carryover balance of \$20 million will be available for obligation.

Within the total amount provided, the committee recommended that not less than \$10 million be allocated to the program for National Sea Grants, authorization for which is contained in Public Law. 90-477 at \$15 million.

The committee also recommended restoration of \$1 million to provide the full amount of the budget estimate of \$3 million for the foundation's special foreign currency program. The committee said it was advised the program would offer "unique opportunities" for research, particularly in the biological and social sciences. "Such projects would not warrant regular funding by the foundation," the committee noted, "but the utilization of excess foreign currencies would make it possible to accomplish worthwhile scientific projects that would not otherwise be supported."

In recommending funds for the Department of Housing and Urban Development, the committee restored \$2 million to the College Housing program to provide the full amount of the budget estimate of \$7.5 million in contract authority for the debt service grant program. The committee said it concurs with the House allowance of the full amount of the budget estimate of \$2.5 million as appropriation for payments on the debt service grants.

The committee recommended deletion of the proviso which prohibits the use of funds appropriated for debt service grants under section 1705 of the 1968 Act to formulate or carry out any grant or loan to any college or university unless such institution is in full compliance with section 504 of Public Law 90-575, the Higher Education Amendments of 1968.

"The committee is advised that the principal point of concern is that private lenders will be unwilling to enter into financing arrangements in the absence of a firm and continuing commitment for annual debt service payments throughout the 40 years of the contract, which the department would be unable to provide under the restrictions of the proviso," the committee said.

The committee recommended \$3.7 billion to run the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, restoring \$18.5 million cut out by the House. The committee said its amount is identical with the total amount of the amended budget estimate and identical with the total amount of the authorization. Its recommendation included an increase of \$19.9 million to provide the full amount of the authorization for research and development.

On Nov. 5, the Senate passed and sent to the White House a compromise bill authorizing \$477.6 million for NSF in the current year. The compromise had been approved by House and Senate conferees Oct. 27 (see Vol. XVIII, No. 38).

The Senate Appropriations Committee, meanwhile, is to take up on Nov. 11 a continuing resolution to finance the U.S. Office of Education and other Federal departments and agencies whose appropriation bills have not been passed yet by Congress. Floor action is scheduled Nov. 12. There are 46 co-sponsors of a resolution, offered by Sen. Joseph M. Montoya (D-N.M.), which is identical to the resolution passed by the House Oct. 28 (see Vol. XVIII, No. 38).

In another Congressional development, the House Education and Labor Committee Nov. 6 approved a \$2.3 billion extension of antipoverty programs, \$295 million above President's request for this fiscal year. The authorization bill (HR 12321) was approved by a party-line vote of 21 to 12. Key Republicans on the committee indicated they would attempt on the House floor to remove funds added (continued)
