Summer class terms set for June-August

Summer semester at UT-Dallas will be a 12-week program opening Tuesday, June 1 and ending Wednesday, Aug. 18.

Classes will be scheduled June 3 through Wednesday, July 7, in the first term. Second term work will run from Monday, July 12, to the mid-August date, including final examinations.

Long term classes run from June 3 through August 18. Final class day for second and long terms is Friday, Aug. 13.

Registration days, June 1-2, will open to enrollments for any or all of the terms.

There will be second term registration days Thursday and Friday, July 8-9, during the break between terms.

Monday, May 31, will be observed as the Memorial Day holiday, and Monday, July 5, will be the Independence Day holiday.

Smith wins V-P runoff election

Student Congress elections were completed April 20, as James B. Smith won a vice-presidential runoff from Dan Adams.

Smith, who has been business manager of the UTD MERCURY during the past academic year, will join President Mike Sullins in the SG offices.

Of nearly 150 runoff votes cast, Smith received 79 percent.

Shades of night fell April 19---

Where were you when the light went out . . . in darkness?

Rooms with views were prized possessions on April 19 at UT-Dallas.

Sunlight, after early fog and mist burned away, was the only illumination during a five-hour electrical blackout.

With power back on just before 4 p.m., evening classes had already been canceled and McDermott Library closed.

It was the only class shut-down in UTD history not caused by winter weather.

A major distribution cable on the core campus developed an apparent short circuit. The circuit breaker failed to operate, putting heavy load on the 13,800 volt lines that come from the north in the Texas Power & Light Company system.

TP&L breakers tripped at 10:05 a.m., shutting down service not only on the campus, but in residence areas fed from a major substation.

Home service was restored to 850 residences in about two hours, and power was available

at the UTD switch house at 1:40 p.m.

The basic fault was still present in feeder line F-2, covering McDermott, Berkner Hall, Southwestern Legal Foundation and the Conference Center.

Relay systems on that circuit did not operate, causing the UTD breaker to hold.

The solution was to switch to an alternate F-1 feeder, which went into full use after another fault had been cleared in Berkner Hall.

Meantime, some classes were taught in hallways and outside rooms; there were many brown bag picnics on patios, and flashlights came into use (even one gasoline mantle lantern).

Greater concerns were for the large amount of refrigeration used in Biology Division, with danger of losing many years' research work.

In Student Union dedication—

Green recalls start of UTD

The Student Union was formally dedicated on Friday, April 23 with Cecil H. Green as the principal speaker for this occasion. Acting President Alexander L. Clark welcomed the many prominent guests on hand for the event.

Co-founder Green gave a synopsis of the evolution of The University of Texas at Dallas. He spoke of how he and his partners Eugene McDermott, J. Erik Jonsson, and President Lloyd V. Berkner initiated the private enterprise of providing an educational institution "... in order to stimulate industrial vigor in competition with other regions, and especially in the newly emerging high technology."

The Graduate Research Center of the Southwest (GRCSW) was born in 1961 and became

The University of Texas at Dallas in 1969 (meantime, in 1967-69, it was re-named the Southwest Center for Advanced Studies because of its regional interests).

In view of this high technology era "You present-day students, as well as those who will have the good fortune to follow you here at UT-Dallas, will have a wonderful opportunity to capitalize fully on this optimum educational environment; not only for your benefit, but also for the benefit of our country as it moves ever deeper into this oncoming electronic age.

"Also, it is important to stress that this is very much a worldwide transition and hence there is a challenge to each of you as you become scientists, engineers, managers and social advisors, to help keep our country in the forefront of this ever-changing world," Green said.

He went on to say "... a student union fulfills a very important purpose, by functioning in effect as a catalyst ... in which undergraduates can meet with each other as well as graduate students and faculty.

"Such informal two-way fraternization can result in both inspiration and learning, as a valuable supplement to formal lectures and classroom instruction ... this facility personifies the university by enhancing loyalty and bountiful supply of school spirit."

At the conclusion of co-founder Green's "A Constant Challenge," he and UT-System Regent Beryl Buckley Milburn cut the ribbon officially dedicating the Student Union.

The Student Union, designed by Pat Spillman (Fisher and Spillman) and other associated architects, houses a short-order grill, a large dining area, and the information center on the ground floor. The Student Union is headquarters for Student Government, Student Activities, and the UTD MERCURY, the student newspaper.

the Founders Building C-circuit, but there were overload difficulties there also.

Other concerns were for computer hardware, and the possibility that a transient or surge of current would be misread as a writing command, with possible loss of data in memories.

Food service, central energy distribution of chilled water for air conditioning, printing and nearly all typing came to a stop; so did police radio base station and the Central Data Acquisition System.

At least one student stuck with the touch system and mechanical machines to keep going on his paper in McDermott's darkened student typing room.

UTD's Scholarship Award program offers four plans for assistance with

- THE TEXAS ASSOCIATION FOR EDUCATIONAL TECHNOLOGY of two awards of \$350 each for fall, 1982 has the following requirements: 1) Senior or graduate student (full-time) and eligible to pursue a full-time graduate course of study in media, i.e., mass communication, library, learning resources, film, radio/TV, etc.; 2) Pick up application in Financial Aid office; 3) letters of recommendation from three UTD faculty; 4) selection will be made on the basis of scholarship, experience and service in the field, letters of recommendation, personal statements, leadership and neatness of application; 5) deadline for application and supporting information is **May 28**. This scholarship is based on need and merit.
- THE STEWART DOSS MEMORIAL SCHOLARSHIP of one award of \$250 for fall, 1982, has the following requirements: 1) Pick up application form in the Financial Aid office; 2) junior or senior standing, enrolled in a communication-related degree program with a religious communications career goal; 3) personal interview with members of the Doss Scholarship selecting committee; 4) essay of 250 words establishing need and stating reasons for choosing to work in the field of religious communication; 5) submit samples of work in chosen field; 6) deadline for applications and supporting information is **May 31** and selection will be made by July 1. This scholarship is based on merit and need.
- THE NATIONAL COUNCIL OF JEWISH WOMEN SCHOLARSHIP of one award (\$20 per course and \$20 per book) for fall, 1982, has the following requirements: 1) Full-time undergraduate or graduate student preparing to be Early Childhood Education Specialists; 2) a letter and/or resume detailing educational background, educational goals, work experience related to child development, financial need, and future plans related child development in the Dallas area; 3) copy of transcripts; 4) three letters of recommendation; 5) deadline **July 1**. - THE INDEPENDENT INSURANCE AGENTS OF AMERICA (IIAA) SCHOLARSHIP of ten awards of \$1,000 for fall, 1982, has the following requirements: 1) Pick up application at the Financial Aid office; 2) be a full-time student who has completed his or her sophomore or junior year; 3) be a U.S. citizen; 4) demonstrate an interest in pursuing a career in insurance; 5) copy of transcripts including the spring semester 1982; 6) deadline is **July 15**. This is a merit-based scholarship.

SEE speakers oppose cuts in aid programs

With a forecast of 3 percent increase in UT-Dallas tuition next year, Tim Baldwin said that a rise in national income will not make up for Reagan budget proposals to cut student aid.

Baldwin, representing Rep. Martin Frost, who ran for reelection in the 24th District in the May 1 primary, said the tuition jumps will be even more at UT-Arlington (14.2 percent) while Southern Methodist and Texas Christian Universities will show increases near 13 percent.

Four primary candidates were speakers in the April 17 meeting of SEE (Students for Educational Equality) at Student Union.

The area session was set up by Mike Carter, UTD psychology student.

Dede Casad, also a graduate student at UT-Dallas, said those who defaulted on federal student loans have hurt the program. Casad ran in the primary as a Republican in the 3rd District.

Democrat Nita K. Smith, who sought nomination in the 3rd District primary, and State Rep. John Bryant, running for the 5th District Democratic nomination, also said the future looked gloomy.

10-year debate on SH190 may come to end

A decade of discussion about location of State Highway 190 was expected to end in late April, with a decision on its route by the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

The 21-mile highway is planned between SH78 in Garland to Interstate 35E in Carrollton, to link south Collin and north Dallas counties to D-FW Airport.

The proposed highway also would open a northern approach to The University of Texas at Dallas. The proposed route would go through University Trust Lands north of the core campus.

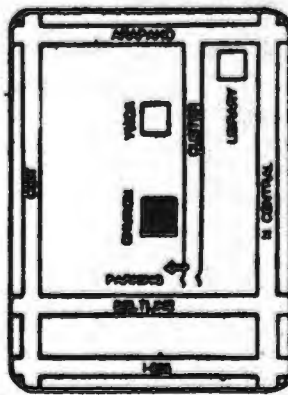
